Upon his father's passing, Matt has lovingly, vet painstakingly, completed the preservation of this tribute to two Lehigh Valley Legends: Mack Trucks and Bethlehem Steel.

Got a Question?

Information requests that we receive at the Mack Museum require individual time and attention. Our archivists, ambassadors, and even curator (pictured below) take time to receive, log, and respond to the dozens of requests we receive weekly. Contrary to popular belief, there is no Google search to produce immediate answers for these types of historical questions. The staff rolls up their sleeves and digs deep searching for just the right file, in just the right cabinet within one of the dozen rooms containing our extensive archive collection.

The archive consists of documents cataloged and stored the old-fashioned way on various types of media, including paper, vellum, Mylar, aperture cards, microfilm, microfiche, slides, and photos. Some requests can be answered within minutes, whereas others require days of research.

As a nonprofit, the Museum greatly appreciates and depends upon the support of true Mack enthusiasts. We appreciate your patience as we work through our request queue, which is populated in chronological order. There is no charge for information from the Mack Trucks Historical Museum; however, tax deductible donations are greatly appreciated.
